# **Current Topics in Gender Economics**

Advanced Seminar (Vertiefungsseminar)

## (a) Course Description

This course covers current topics and research advances in empirical gender economics. It covers recent research on the causes of gender differences in labor market outcomes, including social norms and implicit biases, on the role of institutions and the effectiveness of policy interventions in shaping female and male economic outcomes. Key debates and problems in the economics of gender will be examined based on evidence from (quasi-)experimental evaluation studies.

This seminar is open to advanced Master students interested in empirical economic research in the field of social policy and labor markets, in particular, gender economics, and in empirical methods striving to identify causal effects (e. g, by applying quasi-experimental methods).

To provide students with a state-of-the-art overview of recent research and causal identification methods in Gender Economics, seminar participants are expected to attend the 2nd Berlin Workshop on Empirical Public Economics: Gender Economics, which takes place at the School of Business and Economics, Freie Universität Berlin, October 4 and 5, 2022. The seminar will also cover the book "What Works: Gender Equality by Design" by Iris Bohnet (Harvard University), who will hold the Keynote lecture during the workshop on October 4, 2022. To complete this course, students are expected to elaborate the current state of research on a specific topic in a term paper based on a one of the presented papers at the workshop. The term paper is also expected to contain a critical evaluation of the underlying research paper and its empirical identification strategy. In several block meetings, this seminar offers students a forum to present and discuss their term paper. In order to provide extensive feedback, students will be required to hand in a peer review on an interim draft of another (randomly assigned) course participant. Students are also expected to provide a group presentation on selected chapters of the book "What works" by Iris Bohnet during seminar meetings.

Please note that the course language is English and that active participation in all meetings is mandatory and a part of the grading process.
