Coming Events

The <u>2nd International Conference on Path Dependence</u> will be held on 3rd and 4th March 2011 at the Freie Universität Berlin. The conference aims to provide a platform for discussion of the most recent path-related research from the fields of business studies, economics, geography, sociology and business history. Georg Schreyögg, Jörg Sydow, and Albrecht Söllner, the organizers of the conference, have received more than 50 full papers, from which 36 have been selected for presentation and discussion. The organizers are looking forward to an interesting 2 1/2 days. The sessions may also be attended without presenting a paper.

Huseyin Leblebici, Georg Schreyögg, and Jörg Sydow, the organizers of <u>Subtheme 24</u>: Self-Reinforcing Processes: Stabilizing and Destabilizing Dynamics, have received more than 30 short papers, which are currently under review for presentation and discussion at this year's EGOS Colloquium, scheduled to take place from 7th to 9th July 2011 in Gothenburg, Sweden. The sub-theme aims to bring together researchers who study self-reinforcing and escalating dynamics in organizations and networks as a context for exploring the consequences of organizing effects on the individual, organizational and inter-organizational levels.
